From the Director's Desk

The Idaho Commission for Libraries Annual Statistical Report provides a great snapshot of the Mountain Home Library's customers, services, and resources. The report period ending in FY2015 indicates increases in the numbers and types of collections our library patrons had access to, continued success in providing programs which were interesting and well attended, and an ongoing use of public use computers and Wi-Fi access.

The Summer Reading Program had another outstanding year of attendance with 373 kids reading a total of 4, 954 books over the 5 weeks of the project. One of the highlights of the program was addition of a Family Nite event featuring Career Heroes from the community. 23 individuals, organizations, and businesses were on hand to give demonstrations and talk about their talents. The project was a great success and thoroughly engaged an audience of 370 children and their parents. The Library staff was also pleased to partner, for a second year, with the Community Summer Food program to provide books, story presentations and incentive prizes to participants at two lunch sites.

Perhaps the most significant increase in 2015 was seen in the area of reader's advisory and

reference inquiries with staff providing 10.8% more solutions to customer's requests for help across all areas of services. Through use of Mountain Home Public Library cards, our patrons continued to find value-added access to ten LYNX! Consortium locations located throughout the Boise Valley and southwestern Idaho. Continued collaboration with the Idaho Commission for Libraries, who provide many program opportunities and the LiLi statewide databases, contributed to robust use of library services available to Mountain Home Library patrons through in-house, off-site, and electronic access.

All in all, 2015 was viewed as another significant year of progress. As always, the Library Board, staff and I look forward to discovering as many opportunities for growth and new services as possible in 2016. If you have suggestions regarding the collection, our public access computer and technology offerings, or Library services in general, let us know. Public Library Directors' Summit

Ann Joslin, State Librarian and the Idaho Commission for Libraries hosted the first Idaho Public Directors' Summit in January, 2016. Mountain Home Public Library director Luise House and thirty-seven other public library directors from across the state had the pleasure of meeting for a two-day session in Boise to collaboratively identify policy issues that specifically impact public libraries and use that information to initiate a Community of Practice—"groups of people who share a concern or passion for something they do and learn how to do it better as they interact regularly."

Conference highlights included keynote speaker Maureen Sullivan, Maureen Sullivan Associates and former American Library Association President, who focused on the value of community engagement and introduced the Aspen Institute Action Guide, a step by step process for evaluating library resources; Phil Eastman of Leadership Advisory Group, who took the group through both challenges can be found at <u>http://</u> days of change engagement and, Alison Macrina, Library Freedom Project, who presented updated privacy and security issues now common to the Internet and library systems world-wide.

Participants spent time specifically

identifying the challenges public libraries face in today's environment and emerging themes included a call for greater board engagement, the need to make library consumers aware of the vastly changing array of resources within their reach, and the need to move the perception of libraries from "nice" to "necessary". The conference concluded with in-depth discussion on Strategic Priorities being developed by the Commission which will act as the road map to address issues and concerns discussed during the summit.

The countertops mark the transition of this area to a new technology based space that will be used to facilitate learning by using cutting edge equipment and creative programming.

The Library has partnered with the City Parks and Recreation Department to begin developing a creative environment with an emphasis on modern technology. In the near future you can expect to see things like 3D printers, a 3D scanner, iMacs, and even a state of the art projector with a 8' x 6' screen that can be used for programming. The area will also feature a printing station that anyone can use to print what they need in black and white or color without having to log into a computer.

Laminating services will also be available and in the not so distant future there may even be a small-scale banner printer available to print signs for advertising or use for birthdays, graduations, weddings, etc.
